Second Sunday of Lent Weekend of March 12/13, 2022

In today's second reading we learn that one of Saint Paul's principles of Christian living is to watch and imitate other followers of Christ. There is a pattern for Christian living that Saint Paul wants others to discover and then imitate. This pattern includes a life of prayer, selflessness, sacrifice, and caring for others, including our family of faith. Good stewards choose their friends wisely. They cultivate friendships with other Christian stewards, spend time with them, observe how they live, ask questions about their faith and learn from them. Who are your friends? Are they good stewards of their faith? Are they those who can help you on your own journey of faith?

Father Stanbery will be gone the week of March 13-19. There will be no Stations of the Cross on Tuesday, March 15 or daily Masses this week.

March 19

Even during Lent, there are special days that the Church designates for celebration. The Solemnity of St. Joseph is one of those days. This day is particularly important in Sicily, Italy where San Giuseppe (St. Joseph in Italian) is the patron. The traditions continue in the United States with many Italian-Americans. The spouse of Mary the mother of Jesus and the legal father of Jesus according to Jewish law, Joseph is a model of humility and obedience to God's will. He followed God's instructions, given by angels in his dreams, and took the pregnant Mary into his home as his wife, protected her and Jesus at the child's birth in Bethlehem through the family's sojourn in Egypt, and provided for them as a carpenter in Nazareth. This feast, which was celebrated locally as early as the ninth century, became a universal feast in the fifteenth century, when it was placed on the liturgical calendar. Pope Pius IX named St. Joseph Patron of the Universal Church in 1870; he is also the patron saint of carpenters, the dying, and workers.

Eat Together

Traditional food for the day includes Italian pastries called zeppole or sometimes St. Joseph's Pastries. These are cream-filled pastries with a cherry on top. Minestrone soup is another tradition.

Celebrate Together

One popular tradition originating in Sicily is the St. Joseph's Table. Legends from the Middle Ages attributed the end of a devastating drought to a prayer-devotion that the Sicilian people made to St. Joseph. To show their gratitude, they prepared a table with special foods to honor St. Joseph. This celebration became an annual tradition.

Traditional tables include:

A white tablecloth

Three tiers (representing the Trinity)

A statue of St. Joseph on the top tier Flowers, especially lilies

Candles

Celebratory food

What is the rationale for believing in God?

While Scripture tells us in story form how God created heaven, earth, and humanity, science tells how he has really done so: from a Big Bang of unharnessed energy; to the formation of Earth and the universe; to the evolution of life; and finally, to us! Creation's unfolding is like a magnificent symphony formed from nothing by a powerful, omniscient composer. This "musical score" of evolution rises and falls, inexorably leading to its culmination—intelligent beings who can ponder the beauty and awe of God's creation.

The odds are totally against an accumulation of "lucky breaks" that make creation possible: our Earth being in a narrow habitable zone, neither too near nor too far from the sun; the appearance of oxygenating plants, allowing us to breathe; a dinosaur-destroying asteroid collision permitting mammals—and eventually us—to evolve. 
